 ${}^{ullet}\mathbf{I}$  think it must be self-evident that it is *the most* important question that can possibly occupy the mind of man, how much like God we can be-how near to God we can come on earth preparatory to our being perfectly like Him, and living, as it were in His very heart for ever and ever in Heaven. Any one who has any measure of the Spirit of God must perceive that this is the most important question on which we can concentrate our thoughts; and the mystery of mysteries to me is, how any one, with any measure of the Spirit of God, can help looking at this blessing of holiness and saying, "Well, even if it does seem too great for attainment on earth, it is very beautiful and very blessed. In a great many instances, the very first thing professing Christians do is to resist and reject this doctrine of Holiness as if it were the most foul thing on earth.

could be saved, and yet not know it. At any rate,

I could not permit myself to remain longer in doubt regarding the matter.

'I can never forget the agony I passed through. I used to pace my room till two o'clock in the morning; and when, utterly exhausted, I lay down at length to sleep, I would place my Bible and hymn-book under my pillow, praying that I might wake up with the assurance of Salvation. One morning, as I opened my hymn-book, my eyes fell upon the words:-

> My God, I am Thine! what a comfort divine! What a blessing to know that my Jesus is mine!

Scores of times I had read and sung these words, but now they came home to my inmost soul with a force and illumination they had never before possessed. It was as impossible for me to doubt as it had before been for me to exercise faith. Previously, not all the promises in the Bible could induce me to believe; now, not all the devils in Hell could persuade me to doubt. I no longer hoped that I was saved; I was certain of it. The assurances of my Salvation seemed to flood and fill my soul. I jumped out of bed, and, without waiting to dress, ran into my mother's room and told her what had happened.

No matter what our creed or opinion, God has made it a law of our spiritual being, that without submission and obedience there can be no

confidence. Faith in Jesus is God's expedient for bringing us back to obedience, and not for saving us in disobedience. And all the way through the New Testament He refuses to accept any other proof of discipleship than that of obedience. No less than six times in the 14th and 15th chapters of John is this criterion insisted on. "Faith without works (obedience) is dead," and therefore has no power to take hold of God, or to appropriate His promises. . . . "How can ye believe," said our Lord to some in His day, "while ye receive honour one of another, and seek not the honour that cometh from God only?" And we may say to some in our day-how can ye believe who prefer self-indulgence, wealth, or worldly conformity, to Christ and His cross, and the extension of His kingdom? Is it not still true that "if any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him," and that "the friendship of the world is enmity towards God?" Saving faith in the sinner, and prevailing faith in the believer are alike impossible without full consecration to known duty. If any one disputes this, let him try to exercise faith in any given promise or for any given blessing, while he is refusing obedience to the claims of God, or withholding part of the price which God requires, and he will find, whatever may be his preconceived notions on the subject, that it is simply

Peace is the universal want of man. Everywhere and always the race is in a state of unrest, 'tossing like a troubled ocean,' seeking rest and finding none. Consequently, men adopt many counterfeits, and try to satisfy the aching void of their souls with the opiates of Satan.

Let us look for a moment at the nature of true peace. Peace is not a state of mere quietness or insensibility. Alas! many are in this state of torpor; and when you ask them about their souls, they say, 'Oh, yes! I have a hope; I have a measure of peace. I hope I am right.' But when you try to shake them up, and find out whether they have any thorough foundation for their peace, they don't want to be disturbed. But peace is not insensibility to existing differences between the soul and God; for in such a condition there are all the elements of awful and eternal warfare, and there only needs a change of circumstances in order to land the soul in conflict, distress, and desolation. We do not mean that sort of peace. True peace, Divine peace—the only peace that will do to die with—arises out of a settlement of our differences, and a cessation of hostilities towards God, and reconciliation between the soul and God, bringing assurance and quietness in view of both the past, present, and future.

Somebody was talking to me about here.

Somebody was talking to me about having so much feeling in religion. I said, 'My dear friend, what do you think God gave you feeling for?' Some people seem to think it is a mistake that we have feelings. Our feelings play a very important part in all our social relations. Why would you exclude them from religion? David expressed his feelings, and was so carried away by them that he called on all creation to praise the Lord, the hills and trees to clap their hands and be glad. Get the right kind of religion, and it will make you feel. If you have not the right kind of feeling, I am afraid you have not the right kind of religion. The Lord help you! Well, we have some enthusiasm, and when our enthusiasm dies, I am afraid we shall die, too. Nevertheless, the power of The Salvation Army is not in its enthusiasm; neither does it consist in certain views of truth, or in certain feelings about truth. No! no! But it consists in whole-hearted, thorough, out-and-out surrender to God; and that, with or without feeling, is the right thing, and that is the secret of our power. That is the religion of the Salvation Army. We have glorious feelings as the outcome; but the feeling is not the religion—the feeling is not the holiness. Holiness is the spring and source of the enthusiasm.

'...for four or five months before I commenced speaking ... I passed through some severe heartsearchings.

'I was, as usual, in the minister's pew with my eldest boy, then four . . . A young lady wrote me that she had been the bond slave for four or five years of a certain

besetting sin which she had struggled and wrestled and prayed to overcome. Now and then she would gain the victory, and then down she would go again. She said, 'It is such a subtle thing, connected with my thoughts and imagination, so that I do not think I ever can be saved.' I showed her how dishonouring this unbelief was, and that if she would trust Christ to come and reign in her heart He could cleanse the very thoughts and imaginations. She made a little advance, but said she could not come so far as to think that Christ could purify her thoughts. She believed that He could save her from putting them into practice, but not that He could purify them. I tried to show her how Jesus, by the inspiration of His Holy Spirit, could purify the very thoughts of our hearts and, thank God, she did go another step. She said, 'I rejoice with trembling for fear it should be only temporary, but I have trusted Him to purify the source. I must say He has done it, and instead of thinking these thoughts I have holy thoughts. If Satan presents anything to my mind it is so repulsive to me that I cannot tell you the grief and horror with which it fills me.' Later she said, 'I am conscious that my thoughts are pleasing to Him and He has saved me from this sin which has been the torment of my life for all these years.'

"Peter was therefore kept in prison, but constant prayer was offered to God for him by the church."
 Acts 12:5

 I fear there are comparatively few Christians

who know what prevailing prayer is, because they do not comply with the conditions on which alone it can be offered. I regard these conditions as threefold:

1st. Living and abiding union with Jesus. "If ye abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you." (John xv. 7.)

2nd. Systematic obedience to the teaching of the word and of the Spirit. "Beloved, if our heart condemn us not, then have we confidence towards God. And whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight." (I John iii 21, 22.)

3rd. Unwavering faith in the veracity and faithfulness of God. "But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering; for he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea, driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man think that he shall receive anything of the Lord." (James i. 6, 7.)

Of course there are many other passages of similar bearing and of equal weight, but I regard these three as clearly setting forth the conditions of prevailing prayer, constituting, as it were, the three steps of successful approach to the mercy seat. They are like three links of a golden chain connecting our souls with God, and if one be missing or defective, the power to prevail in prayer is lost.

# "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1 'While we are to "labour to please God", we are

to remember that this is not the ground of our acceptance, which is alone the Precious Blood. Not by works of righteousness that we have done, but according to His mercy He saves us.

'Remember, it is the Blood that cleanses the soul. Works meet for repentance is one thing, the faith that heals is another; both are indispensable. The little child or the vilest sinner who dares trust for a full Salvation gets it, while the most careful, principled, and determined disciple who doubts misses it. God cannot help it. He is bound to give or withhold according to our faith. It is not arbitrary on His part. In the very nature of the case, it is the only line on which He can meet us. I believe if He could have saved us in an easier way He would, but there was no other way.

should desperately withstand those who he sees are going to be used of God. Supposing you were the Devil, and had set your heart on circumventing God, how would you do it but by opposing those who were bent on building up His Kingdom?

'Yes; the trial of faith is precious, more precious than angel can conceive, when borne with patience and perseverance which will not yield. It is hard, and sometimes bloody, but it brings present and eternal glory. "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation."

'God cannot make heroes except by conflict, any more than man can. Who ever heard of a hero who never fought? The raw recruits run away. It is the well-trained veteran, inured to danger and bloodshed, who stands the rudest shocks of the enemy and holds on to death. "Courage!" your Captain cries. "Only be thou strong, and of a good courage, and I will be with thee, and teach thee what thou shalt say." "He hath chosen the weak things." He has not made shift with them—taken them because there were no others. No! He hath chosen them. Will He ever forsake them, and thus make Himself a laughing-stock for Hell? Never! Will He ever let the Devil say, "Ah, ah! He chose this weak one and then let him fail"? No, no NO!"

I perceived that I had been in some degree of

error with reference to the nature, or rather the attainment of sanctification, regarding it rather as a great and mighty work to be wrought in me through Christ, than the simple reception of Christ as an all-sufficient Saviour, dwelling in my heart, and thus cleansing it every moment from all sin.

'I struggled through the day until a little after six in the evening, when William joined me in prayer. While he was saying, "Lord, we open our hearts to receive Thee", that word was spoken to my soul: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If any man hear My voice, and open unto Me, I will come in and sup with him." I felt sure He had long been knocking, and, Oh, how I yearned to receive Him as a perfect Saviour! But, Oh, the inveterate habit of unbelief!

'When we got up from our knees I lay on the sofa, exhausted with the excitement and effort of the day. William said, "Don't you lay all on the altar?" I replied, "I am sure I do!" Then he said, "And isn't the altar holy?" I replied in the language of the Holy Ghost, "The altar is most holy, and whatsoever toucheth it is holy". Then said he, "Are you not holy?" I replied with my heart full of emotion and with some faith, "Oh, I think I am". Immediately the word was given me to confirm my faith, "Now are ye clean through the word which I have spoken unto you."...

This is the will of God, even your

sanctification,' wrote Paul to the Thessalonians.

There is a sense, and an important sense, in which sanctification must be the will of man. If it is not my will the divine will can never be accomplished in me. I must will to be sanctified, as God is willing that I should be sanctified. James, in his epistle, says, 'Draw nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands, ve sinners; and purify your hearts, ye double minded.' This was said to people who had been professing to believe, but had gone back under the dominion of their fleshly appetites. There are two or three other texts which seem to sum up the whole matter as, for instance, 'Jesus Christ . . . gave Himself for us (that is, for us Christians, the whole Church of God) that He might redeem us from all iniquity. and purify unto Himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works'

. . . And again, in I John 3:3, 'Every man that hath this hope in Him purifieth himself, even as He is pure.' These are summing-up texts and there are numbers of others to show that the whole purpose of redemption is to restore us to purity; not only to purge us from the past, but to keep us purged to serve the living God.

### "When my soul fainted within me, I remembered the Lord;" Jonah 2:7

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I am told that I have a practical mind, and I am glad I have. I hope I shall keep it to the end. I believe that any other kind of mind will be found

to have been a snare, when we get before the throne of God; because Jesus Christ is going to be intensely practical in that day. He is not going to say 'Inasmuch as ye *thought* it,' or 'Inasmuch as ye *felt* it,' or 'Inasmuch as ye *intended* it,' or 'Inasmuch as ye *promised* it'—but He is going to say 'Inasmuch as ye *did* it.' I want to be among the doers, and I want you to be among the doers.

What we have to come to is to accept God's will for our lives; but in many cases people won't do this. They won't accept the hardship which following Jesus Christ involves; they like ease and comfort; but to follow Jesus Christ in the way He lays down involves a great deal of hard work. It involves the continual use of all our faculties, not allowing any of them to lie by to rust, not using any of them, either mental or physical, merely for our own gratification.

We are His servants, we are His children, we are His husbandmen, and He will demand the increase of all the faculties He has given us.

You must accept God's plan, you must chose it, and say, 'Yes, Lord, I will have this one ambition, motive and desire to live for Thee alone.' You must not only say it, but act it out.

 Some people, even after they are converted, are too proud to own themselves wrong, or to confess when they have sinned. Catherine was

not of that sort. In one of her letters to her mother she ends with these words:

'Pray for me, dear mother, and believe me, with all my faults and besetments, your loving child.'

Her hunger after a holy life was real and practical. She knew she must learn to live by method—that is, doing right, whether she liked it or not-and not by feelings, if she was to be of use in the world.

So at the end of the year she wrote some new resolutions: . . .

'I have been writing a few daily rules for the coming year, which I hope will prove a blessing to me, by the grace of God. I have got a paper of printed rules also, which I intend to read once a week. May the Lord help me to keep to them! But, above all, I am determined to search the Scriptures more attentively, for in them I have eternal life. I have read my Bible through twice during the past sixteen months, but I must read it with more prayer for light and understanding. Oh, may it be my meat and drink! May I meditate on it day and night! And then I shall bring forth fruit in season; my leaf also shall not wither, and whatsoever I do shall prosper.'

... it would be a great mistake to regard Mrs. Booth as merely a humanitarian. One of the few

letters I ever received from her concludes with an emphatic protest against the attempt to reduce Christianity to mere humanitarianism.... She wrote:

"Christ must be the best expounder of His own system, and He declares over and over again that His first and highest work in this world, was to glorify His Father and to reveal God to man. He further taught that there was no other way of doing this than by the revelation of, and the reception of, Himself.

"Christianity is as much a spirit as a practice, and herein it differs from all other religions and ethical systems, inasmuch as the practice of it is impossible without the infusion of the living spirit of the author. A man must live, by Christ and in Christ, a supernatural life before he can exemplify the principles, or practise the precepts, of Christianity; they are too high for unrenewed human nature, it cannot attain unto them. To love the brethren for Christ's sake, and because of Christ's love shed abroad in the heart, is quite different from loving the brethren for their own sakes, or even for the gratification of mere mutual generosity or benevolence.

Love to the King and concern for His interests must be the master passion of the soul. Without this, all outward effort, even that which springs from a sense of duty, will fail. The hardship and suffering involved in spiritual warfare are too great for any motive but that of love. It is said that one of the soldiers of Napoleon, when being operated upon for the extraction of a bullet, exclaimed, 'Cut a little deeper and you will find my general's name' it was engraven on his heart. So must the image and glory of Christ be engraven on the heart of every faithful soldier of Christ. It must be the all-subduing passion of his life to bring the reign of Jesus Christ over the hearts and souls of men. A little child who has this spirit will subjugate others to his King, while the most talented and learned and active, without it, will accomplish comparatively little. If the hearts of the Christians of this generation were inspired with this spirit, and set on winning the world for God, we should soon see nations shaken to their centre, and millions of souls translated into the Kingdom.

'If I were asked for the main characteristics that

have helped me through life, I should give a high place among them to the sense of responsibility which I have felt from my earliest days in regard to everybody who came in any way under my influence. The fact that I was not *held* responsible was no relief at all.

An early illustration of this trait in Catherine's character was one day manifested.

While running along the road with hoop and stick, she saw a prisoner being dragged to the lock-up by a constable. A jeering mob was hooting the unfortunate culprit. His utter loneliness appealed powerfully to her. It seemed that he had not a friend in the world. Quick as lightning, Catherine sprang to his side, and marched down the street with him, determined that he should feel that there was at least one heart that sympathized with him, whether it might be for his fault or his misfortune that he was suffering. The knight-errant spirit which Kate manifested, when, as a mere child, she threw down the gauntlet to the mocking crowd, and dared to take the part of the lonely, hustled criminal, was peculiarly typical of the woman who afterward stood by the side of her husband and General, helping him to face the scorn of his day and generation, until unitedly, with character vindicated and name be-blessed, they had climbed to a position of successful achievement, unique in the history of the world.

### "... I remember you in my prayers night and day, . . ." 11 Timothy 1:3 I believe that more souls are convinced in real

prayer than in speaking. I have noticed this many a time. I have seen at the bottom of a great hall or theatre, or in the gallery, a lot of the roughest men conceivable, behaving in the most unseemly manner, arrested by the influence of prayer. Perhaps, when the rowdyism has been ready to break into open tumult, a little woman has stretched out her hands over the congregation, and said, "Now, let us pray;" and I have seen the whole mass of men assume an attitude of quietness and reverence. I have watched the aspect of the congregation, and seen great, rough, black-faced fellows get their heads down, and sometimes wipe their eyes; and when we have got up to sing, there has been no more disorderly conduct, but they have settled down with the solemnity of death to listen.

He is like the prodigal who, when he sat in the swine-yard amongst the husks and the filth, fully resolved, and at last acted. He went, and that was the test of his penitence. He might have sat resolving and promising till now, if he had lived as long, and he would never have got the father's kiss, the father's welcome, if he had not started; but he went, and went to his father honestly and said 'I have sinned'-which implied a great deal more in his language then than it does in ours now. Then comes the proof of his submission, 'and am no more worthy to be called thy son: make me as one of thy hired servants'—put me in a stable, or set me to clean the boots, so that I can be in thy family and have thy smile. That is Jesus Christ's own beautiful illustration of true penitence.
