SALVOS SCHOOLS – PRESENTATIONS AND WORKSHOPS

Salvos Schools aims to empower school communities by educating students about how others their age are at risk, and equipping them to respond to social issues.

- The Caledonia Foundation's funding of The Oasis & Salvos Schools was recognised as one of the top 50 philanthropic initiatives in Australian history.
- Since 2011, we have completed workshops and events for more than 300 schools and 40,000 participants.

In our presentation and workshops, students explore the following themes:

- How to support yourself and others through stressful situations;
- Mental health, family breakdown, abuse and alcohol/other drugs;
- Stereotypes, stigmas, attitudes and how they can contribute to inequality;
- Developing resilience and overcoming adversity;

AIMS

Youth Homelessness: An Introduction is an experience that provides students with an opportunity to understand and empathise with what it would be like to experience homelessness in Australia.

Students will learn about the statistics and facts of homelessness in Australia, different homelessness services, hear real stories, partake in open discussions and learn how to support someone at risk of and experiencing homelessness.

Students will gain a broader understanding of at risk groups within their community and feel better equipped to talk about and respond to homelessness.

FREEDOM PARTNERSHIP - MODERN SLAVERY PRESENTATIONS

The Freedom Partnership mobilises community, business and government to realise their contributions to modern slavery and take action to eradicate it. The Freedom Partnership champions collaborative, inclusive and networked strategies to address modern slavery.

Ending slavery requires collective action to dismantle the parts that make up the system of slavery. The Freedom Partnership school presentations empower and mobilise students through an exploration of the following topics:

1. Collaboration and leadership;
2. Mobilising communities to take action;
3. Empowering survivors to be advocates;
4. Engaging business and organisations to ensure they do not contribute to slavery;
5. Partnering with local, state, and territory governments on localised responses;
6. Advocacy for policy reform to improve Australia's national action plan on slavery.

The Freedom Partnership can present to your school, participate at events and support your school to take action.

Laura Vidal is a social worker with a Master's degree in Human Rights Law & Policy. Laura was Senior Caseworker at Australia's only Safe House for Trafficking and Slavery for three years.

Freedom Partnership, The Salvation Army's national initiative to end modern slavery.



THE OASIS EDUCATION AND OUTREACH

All schools provide an excellent environment for early detection of risk factors that lead to homelessness and family breakdown. Therefore schools also provide an excellent avenue to assist families and young people to access appropriate support services to prevent homelessness.

While homelessness is devastating when you're young it does not have to dictate a young person's future. The life of someone who has been raised in a supportive and loving family and that of someone who has left home at 14 does not have to be so different. But it is, and schools play an important role in addressing this issue and helping change a young person's life.

A devotee of the Salvation Army since his early 20s Ken Depena, now 82, is the quintessential soldier. Having chosen collecting as his ministry, he has spent over half a century trawling the establishments of the inner city with his little wooden box, raising money for the Army's good work.

●●● **Wall Boy** (22 minutes)

A shy, young runaway finds himself forced into sex work at the 'Wall' in Sydney. The boy's only respite is a quick break on board an outreach bus. A youth worker becomes ever more desperate to break through to him, before he spirals beyond the point of no return.

Slavery in Australia – really?

- The Global Slavery Index (2013) estimates that 3200 people are enslaved in Australia.
- Australians contribute to the enslavement of 20.9 million people worldwide through products we consume and trade (International Labour Organisation, 2012).
- Slavery can occur in Australian industries such as in hospitality, beauty, cleaning, factory work, domestic work, construction, farming, sex work and retail.
- Early and forced marriages are considered to be a form of slavery and are against the law.

What is slavery?

People who are sold as objects, forced to work for little or no pay and are entirely under the control of their slaveholders. There are many characteristics that distinguish slavery from other human rights violations, however only one needs to be present for slavery to exist.

Someone is in slavery if they are:

- Forced to work through mental or physical threat;
- Owned or controlled by their employer, usually through mental or physical abuse or the threat of abuse;
- Dehumanised, treated as a commodity or bought and sold as property;
- Physically constrained or have restrictions placed on their freedom of movement.

HOPE FOR LIFE

Each year, more people die by suicide than in car accidents. The tragedy of suicide claims the lives of more than 2500 Australians each year (2012 ABS Census).

The grief, confusion and anguish that comes from losing someone you love – whether a family member, friend or colleague – is devastating. For every person who dies, another eight people are directly affected by this loss. Suicide directly affects more than 16,000 Australians every year.

The Hope for Life Suicide Prevention and Bereavement Support provides information, resources and training for those who need it; those supporting others at risk of suicide or those who have lost a loved one to suicide.

QPR Suicide Prevention

QPR (Question, Persuade and Refer) is a free online training program that takes only 60 minutes to complete.

Just as people trained in CPR help save thousands of lives each year, people trained

in QPR learn how to recognise the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to Question, Persuade and Refer someone to help.

QPR training includes:

- Myths and facts about suicide;
- Some warning signs of suicide;
- How to apply QPR;
- How to offer hope and support to others.

QPR was written by Dr Paul Quinnett, PhD., a clinical psychologist and trainer with more than 35 years experience. The training can be accessed easily through our online course and the material is user-friendly, engaging and easy to digest.

RED SHIELD APPEAL

The Red Shield Appeal is The Salvation Army's primary annual fundraising drive.

The Red Shield Appeal Doorknock takes place on the last weekend of May and offers Australians from all walks of life a chance to not only get behind the Salvos but to be part of transforming the lives of people right around the country. This year, the doorknock will be held on 30-31 May.

For 150 years, The Salvation Army has used the Red Shield Appeal to raise much-needed funds for those in our community who are disadvantaged. We need 100,000 volunteers across Australia to generously give up their time and join us on the frontline.

We couldn't do this work without the fantastic level of support from schools and their students. By volunteering and generously sharing their time to help us, students are rewarded with a sense of personal satisfaction and fulfilment.

The Red Shield Appeal is more than raising funds. We are passionate about connecting students to their local community, strengthening their understanding of community issues and services, helping young people to support themselves and others and providing leadership-development opportunities.

If your school is interested in an activity that changes lives and communities, here are some ways you can be involved:

- Include the dates of the Red Shield Appeal Doorknock in your school calendars and newsletters;
- Encourage students to be involved in the doorknock and/or the Red Shield Youth Project;

THE COUCH PROJECT

“Raising awareness of hidden homelessness”

It's not a sleepover if you can't go home.

The Couch Project is a fundraising and awareness campaign held in Winter each year which aims to combat youth homelessness through educating students on the dangers of couch surfing. The Couch Project is an opportunity for students to take action.

When a young person thinks that their home is no longer a safe place, they tend to go to and stay at a mate's place. While it's a little less scary than sleeping rough on the streets, it's just as dangerous. Eventually they will run out of couches to sleep on and end up sleeping on the couches of friends of friends, dealers, or worse.

This is a reality for 44,083 young people in Australia (under 24 years of age). It is hidden homelessness and it is a downward spiral of instability.

Funds raised through The Couch Project go directly towards providing services and programs for homeless youth across Australia.

Student opportunities to get involved in The Couch Project:

- Spend a night on your couch and get your family and friends to sponsor you;
- Organise a sleepover at a friend's place and get sponsored for sleeping on their couch;
- Organise a mass sleepout or movie night at school to fundraise for The Couch Project.



*“My friend said that she would take me in. She knew how tough things were at home. Our school uniform was a really long skirt which was good for me because you couldn't see my bruises. I still got assignments done but it was getting harder. My grades were starting to slip and my friend was the only one who knew. So one day I packed my bags and didn't look back. After two nights at my friend's place, her mother said that as they were having people over that weekend it would be best if I went home. I couldn't go back home. I didn't know where to go.” – Leah**

THE FREEDOM PARTNERSHIP

The Freedom Partnership supports victims of trafficking and slavery in Australia, ensuring they get the right help at the right time. Support is fully funded by community donations. There are two ways of offering that support to victims in Australia.

The Salvation Army Trafficking and Slavery Safe House

The Salvation Army Trafficking and Slavery Safe House operates entirely on community donations and is the only service of its kind in Australia. Just \$50 provides one week of emergency food support to a resident with no income and \$30,000 supports a room in the Safe House for one year. Any contribution makes a difference.

The Freedom Fund

The Freedom Fund supports victims to access basic services such as shelter, transport, food and emergency medical care nationwide when no other support is available. Most people escape their slavery situation without police and need a safe place where they can consider their options. Sometimes, this can take weeks, creating a gap period where victims may be turned away from services. This creates a risk of re-exploitation, homelessness and hopelessness. Help us ensure that safe and professional support is available for people escaping slavery until they are able to access more formal supports.



CHRISTMAS APPEAL

Ways your school can get involved:

- Run an event to support the Salvos like a Christmas concert, Christmas movie marathon, garage sale, car wash or Christmas tree decoration stall;
- Donate gifts to the Kmart Wishing Tree or organise for them to be picked up from school;

HEART FOR LONELY BECOMES CHRISTMAS TRADITION

The Salvation Army's presence in the Sydney north-west suburb of Macquarie Park has been life-changing for Anne and many in her community.

When Anne and her husband moved to Macquarie Park in the late 1980s, it was not considered an ideal community to raise their three children. Social problems such as vandalism, graffiti, theft and drugs kept police busy. A less obvious, but growing problem, was social isolation.

But Anne also saw hope.

"The Salvation Army would come around to the community, bringing bread for residents and taking young people to youth group, to help to get them off the streets," she says.

Anne had always wanted to find out more, but her husband didn't want to get involved and their marriage began to suffer.

When their third child was just seven weeks old, Anne's husband left. One of the first places Anne turned to was The Salvation Army.

Anne began attending Salvation Army church services and her children quickly became involved in various activities. Life, for the meantime, seemed to be heading down a positive, hopeful road. However, as each Christmas loomed, Anne began struggling with feelings of loneliness.

"Every other time of the year you can cope. But at Christmas there is just something about being alone with kids that makes you feel more alone," she says.

One Christmas, when Anne only had one of her children for the day, she jumped on a bus and headed to the city, hoping that would make her feel less lonely. That trip was a turning point.

She suddenly realised she wasn't alone in her feelings. There were many people in society who were also lonely at Christmas. Then an idea hit her – maybe she could do something, even if just in her community, to meet this need.

Anne decided to host a Christmas Eve dinner at her house. "It came from knowing what it was like to be alone, and thinking that there must be other people out there who must feel the same. So I thought, let's do something about it," she says.

The first year, she had eight people at her house for Christmas Eve dinner. Over the past 11 years the number has grown, and last year she lost count after 40 people had come through her front door. "Now, in a way, it's become a tradition," she says.

Salvos Gifts

The funds collected through The Chick Effect campaign will go towards a Livestock Keeping Project in the communities of Penagoberri, Sartaguda and Tudubali in India. This project will benefit more than 500 people who live in these communities where war has been witnessed, women's rights are lacking and poverty is prevalent.

Salvos Sponsorship

Our sponsorship program is based on giving all children freedom through the power of a community. Our sponsorship goal is to be community builders. Building communities where children can grow and develop holistically is paramount to the reduction of poverty. For this reason we aim to implement programs that are child-focused, relationship-based and sustainable. These projects focus on helping children by working alongside and empowering communities to lift themselves out of poverty. The Salvos Sponsorship program helps provide children, their family and community with nutritional meals, access to clean drinking water sources, toilets, health care, education, training and equipment, microcredit finance, livestock and disability facilities.

STUMP

Plenty of people want to do something about poverty and injustice, but knowing where to start is often the hardest part. STUMP is a project organised by the team at Streetlevel which helps equip young people with practical learning and hands on experience to sustainably do life with some of Australia's poor and marginalised in their own backyard. The project runs throughout the year as a 1-5 day experience with a program to suit. STUMP is an opportunity to get exposed to real social issues and the people who face these issues every day.

Examples of activities your students can be part of:

- Serving and getting to know the community through practical means (preparing meals, connecting with community) in a safe environment
- Get educated about the issues and how to respond by attending specialist training and workshops on a range of issues
- Participating in a guided street walk to see first hand some of the issues and challenges facing members of the community in an urban setting.

Salvos Ambassador Movement (SAM) is a 12-month leadership development opportunity for students 15 years and over. Students learn about and participate in The Salvation Army's response to social issues. SAM is an extra-curricular opportunity with fortnightly meetings held after school and during holidays.

The Salvation Army partners with Praxis to deliver the Praxis Youth Work Diploma. It is a faith-based two-year accredited course for young people aged 18-28. It involves:

- Two-day placements with NSW and ACT Salvo centres to experience both youth and community-based activities.
- Four residential block courses held at the beginning of each term to introduce modules where learning is based on action and reflection.
- Weekly class days for lectures, catch-up and visits to schools to run programs and mentor youth.
- Each student is supported by the Edify co-ordinator, a mentor, placement co-ordinator and the Praxis staff.




